## **Atlantic Highlands First Aid Launches Rescue Boat**

TLANTIC HIGHLANDS -The Atlantic Highlands First Aid Squad has significantly increased its water rescue capabilities with the addition of a 1999, 18-foot Boston Whaler.

The vessel is equipped with first aid supplies and the tools required to safety and swiftly transport an injured patient from the harbor and mooring fields to an awaiting ambulance.

"We have a very busy harbor," said AHFAS president Lou Marotta. "With a ferry service, fishing boats and recreational boaters, there are a lot of things that can happen in the water. We want to be prepared and have access to any emergencies in the water."

Already, the vessel was used to respond to a recent 4 a.m. call of a man missing in the water. The man turned up safe, yet if he were hurt and in the water, the AHFAS was there to help.

Marotta noted the squad works closely with the Atlantic Highlands Fire and Police Departments in water rescue



situations.

"This is an important addition to our squad," Marotta said. "We have an active, yearround harbor and as an EMS organization we want to be prepared for anything. This will greatly benefit the community."

The Atlantic Highlands First Aid & Rescue Squad is an allvolunteer emergency services organization that operates completely on donations from the community. The AHFAS provides free services to area residents 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Dedicated members of the squad give their own time for top-level training and, more important, to help their neighbors in need. So far, the organization is on track to answer 600 calls this year.

In addition to answering emergency calls, the squad also helps Santa get around town through "Santa Runs," now scheduled for Dec. 5-9 from 6 to 9 p.m.

The purpose of the Committee is to facilitate the use of Borough facilities, services and employees for special events that are going to be held in the Borough. We will also recommend any safety requirements that should be in place to keep the event sponsors and the event participates safe from any harm or danger. The Special Events committee will consist of one representaive from each department within the Borough A Special Event is defined as an event outside of the normal pushess operations of a public entity that would use a municipal facility and, or road within the Borough for heir special event, such as carnivals, concerts, parades, fireworks, fairs, or block parties.

Anyone wishing to submit a request should apply at least three months in advance so that the committee can review all applications. The Special Events Committee will approve, deny or defer applications. This Committee will meet every third Friday of the month.

At it's meeting on September 14, 2005, the Mayor: and Council appointed 16 year resident Adam Hubeny to the position of Borough Administrator. The Administrators position has been vacant since the untimely passing of the late John Phair in May of this year. The Governing Body engaged the serv-ices of Frederick Jahn, from Jersey Professional Management, to fill the position on a temporary basis Jersey Professional was also contracted to assist in the exhaustive search for the candidate who would be charged with the responsibility of handling the day-to-day business affairs of the Borough. The Administrator serves as the liaison between the Mayor and Council and the various boards, committees and agencies of the Borough. Adam Hubeny was born and raised in Colts Neck, NJ and attended their local public schools. As a young man, Adam was very active with the Colts Neck Fire Department and served in 1987 as the youngest Fire Chief in Monmouth County. He held the Fire Chief's title for several years and in 1988 became the President of the Colts Neck First Aid Squad. He was awarded the Fireman of the Year award by his peers for four consecutive years dating back to 1983. Adam has spent the last twentyfive years in Law Enforcement and has distinguished himself as a dedicated, conscientious, and loyal public servant. He has been recognized as a leader in Emergency Management and Homeland



Security issues. He started his law enforcement career in September of 1980. He worked full time in Colts Neck as a Special Police Officer and in 1984 became the first full time sworn Patrolman in Colts Neck history. In 1987 Adam came to Atlantic Highlands and served as a Patrolman for a year and a half before being assigned to the Detective Bureau. He joined the Atlantic Highlands Fire Department in 1988 and served two terms as Fire Chief, in 1999 and 2002. He has been the Fireman's

## NEW HENRY HUDSON ADDITION NAMED IN HONOR OF THE LATE GENEVIEVE M. HAWLEY

The recently completed addition to the Henry Hudson Regional School in Highlands has been named in honor of the late Genevieve M. Hawley, who for many years here in Atlantic Highlands was a local political and community leader.

The new addition, which was formally dedicated on September 22, 2005, will be known as the Genevieve M. Hawley Multi-Purpose Resource Center. This new building addition, which was approved by local voters in 2003, consists of a new state of the art cafetorium, meeting rooms and a throughly modern theater.

Mrs. Hawley, who retired in 1998 as the district director for Representative Frank Pallone, Jr., passed away on May 5, 2002 from a tragic accident. A community and political leader for more than 40 years, Mrs.Hawley served as an elected representative from Atlantic Highlands to the Henry Hudson Regional Board of Education from 1978 to 1995 when she resigned from the board because she moved to her water front cottage in Highlands. In 1998 she was appointed to the board for an unexpired term rep-Borough of resenting the

Highlands and in 1999 she was elected from that community to fill the remainder of that two-year term and in 2001 she was reelected to a full three year term from Highlands, thus becoming the first citizen to represent both communities on the nine member board of education.

Mrs. Hawley was the president of the regional board for several terms, was a member and chair of every board committee during her tenure and was the board's vice-president

In addition to her membership on the board, Mrs. Hawley was a long time delegate to the New School Jersey Boards Association, served as New Jersey's Sixth Congressional District representative to the National School Boards Federal Relations Network, served as a member of the National School Boards Association's Legislative Committee and as a member of the board of directors for both the New Jersey and National School Boards Associations.

In the early 1960's she, along

with Bernie Frotton, were the founders of the first Atlantic Highlands Recreation Committee and she was responsible for the planning and the creation of the many so called "pocket parks" which currently exist throughout Atlantic Highlands. In the 1960's Mrs. Hawley was also a member of the planning committee for the construction of the borough hall.


Throughout the years Mrs. Hawley served as a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, was a member and the chairwoman of the Atlantic Highlands Rent Leveling Board and was a member of the Planning Board. She was also a long time member and a past president of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Atlantic Highlands Fire Department and she was one of the founding members of the Atlantic Highlands Historical Society. In 1976 she was the editor of the borough's Bicentennial Cookbook.

A Girl Scout leader for more than 40 years, Mrs. Hawley served for many years as a member of the executive committee for the Monmouth Council of Girl Scouts and she was a member of the board of directors of the New Jersey Red Cross, where she chaired the agency's diaster committee.

Upon her death Mrs. Hawley's family decided to form the Genevieve M. Hawley Memorial Foundation as a tribute to her many years of community service. To date the foundation has given out almost \$20,000 in scholarships to area students and has donated several thousands of dollars to other worth while local organizations. The foundation sponors the annual Genevieve M. Hawley Memorial Scholarships program, the annual Genevieve M. Hawley Community Service Award and the Genevieve M. Hawley Civic Awards.

Those outstanding area students who received the 2005 scholarships from the foundation included Troy Hartsgrove, Kendra Boyd and Sara Weimer all from Henry Hudson, John Archibald, from St. Agnes School, D.J. Miragliotta, from the Atlantic Highlands Elementary School and Jayne Cooper, from the Highlands Elementary School.


