

he upcoming summer season is a particularly significant one because we will be celebrating the selflessness of the members of our 125-year-old fire department.

As you no doubt have noticed, banners honoring our firefighters have been placed on all the Victorian-style lamps on First Avenue and at the harbor, all sponsored by local residents and business people. Then in July, the department will stage its annual Firemen's Fair at the harbor, culminating a spectacular fireworks display. And then, on Saturday, July 7th beginning at 3:00 pm, Atlantic Highlands will host a parade featuring fire companies from far and near.

The firefighters -- some 100 strong -- and I are hoping that all of you will plan on attending and participating.

Not only do these activities serve to honor those who serve and protect our community, but they give us an opportunity to pause and remember those who served us who have passed away.

With our servicemen and women involved in an overseas war and memories of 9/11 remarkably fresh in our minds, it is well worth reflecting on all our heroes, including

those volunteers who provide us with emergency services, namely our firefighters and first aiders, and their essential support personnel.

Our fire department began in 1882 and acquired its first fire truck a year later. In 1889, the first firehouse was built on Center Avenue which was succeeded in 1917 by a building constructed on Mount Avenue, the site of our current Emergency Services Building, a modern structure built in 1997.

It was not until 1915 that the department acquired its first motor-driven pumper, despite having been organized for 33 years. That pumper was purchased with the proceeds from a Shakespearian performance by the Robert B. Mantell Players.

With this interesting past in mind, we all need to take a moment to remember the sacrifices made by volunteers past and present and by their families. They have given freely of their time to serve us, often by putting their lives in jeopardy.

It is with great pride and humility that I express my considerable appreciation for the service of our emergency volunteers and urge you to do the same.

of winding down our involvement in Iraq, it is well we remember those who have died in this and other wars. We should never forget their ultimate sacrifice.

It is a sad fact that in vastly improving our medical care, more of our children have survived war with disabilities that will plague them for years to come.

Although Memorial Day is primarily aimed at honoring those who didn't survive our various wars, it should also make us cognizant of our duties to those who live. It is our life-long obligation to make sure they have the very best care that a civilized country can give ... no matter what it costs.

Whether we, as individuals, approve our country's involvement in this war or others --Korea and Vietnam come to mind -- or not, there is no way we can forget those who served once the conflict ends. although some Americans would like to do so.

Sadly, we don't have a great track record of properly taking care of our wounded, maimed or otherwise scarred.

veteran's care in substandard facilities too far from their homes.

Not only is it deplorable to treat our veterans this way but it is patently unfair on their families. The continuing results of war for the living have produced untold stress, broken homes, homelessness and crime.

Although those who died at war are highly worthy of our honors, it is equally true for the survivors. We should be as outraged for those treated shabbily as we are about those whose lives were ended prematurely.

All losses in war infuriate us. And, yes, they instill in us a sense of pride in the willingness of our troops to put their lives on the line.

Even those who want the Iraq war to end assert that they "Support Our Troops." But saying so and doing so are not the same. Support for our troops means many things but it doesn't mean forgetting them when theycome home.

It has been said, by me and others, that questioning the war and our anti-terrorism policies is not unpatriotic. But it would be unpatriotic to abandon our war survivors.

Just as we have the right to object without sacrificing our basic rights, we have an obligation to protest if our war survivors are treated in any way less than the heroes they are.

To be blunt, we must get political. In other words, we must harness our political system by making it clear to our families, friends and elected representatives that we demand proper care for our war survivors ... not matter what it takes.

Yes, my friends, this is a day to honor our war dead. And, too, it is certainly a day to remember the survivors. This is the best way we can honor their service.

To do less would be to betray all those who struggled and died for the America we love.

On Earth Day - April 21, the Environmental Commission published a leaflet titled "Climate Change in Atlantic Highlands." It shows where our bay shoreline would be in A.D. 2100 if scientists' prediction of sea level rise are correct; lists 10 things you can do and 10 things towns can do to reduce local carbon emissions; and debunks 10 myths about global warming. Get a copy in the Borough Hall business office, or read it on the Borough website www.ahnj.com (under "departments," click on Environmental Commission, and open Greensheet no. 5).

Another timely topic in the warmer weather is how to green our yards in ways that save work, water and fertilizer and are environmentally friendly. Advice about that is available in Greensheet no. 4 titled

"Rethink Lawns - Plant Native Species" that the Commission just issued on the same web site.

While you're surfing there, have a look at three earlier Greensheets, which have just been posted:

No.1. From Source to Spigot: Everything you always wanted to know about your water supply but had no time to ask.

2. The Bayfront Environment of Atlantic Highlands.

3. Inventory of Animals and Plants in Lenape Woods.


If you need official local environmental data, a 120-page complete inventory and reference work is given on the Commission's web site, titled "Our Town's Environment: Report on Environmental Resources and Issues in Atlantic Highlands."

The AHFAS also has a cadet program for students starting at age 14 who are interested in being a part of a dynamic organization. "If anything, the realm of volunteerism is one of the few areas that really bring us together, regardless of profession, educational background, income level, etc," wrote author Christopher Cathcart in his book, "The Lost Art of Giving Back: A Helpful Guide to Making a Difference." "It's truly a level playing field."





July is Scrabble® Month


