

Mayor's Message Frederick J. Rast

Dear Residents:

Well Folks, fall is almost over and soon, the cold breath of winter will be upon us. The trees are beautiful at this time of the year, but they make a mess! Fall deserts us with piles of leaves all around our streets. Our Street Department works to keep them at a reasonable level and our storm drains clear from the foliage.

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Also with the beautiful colors at this time of year, come new dangers to our children and elderly citizens. Downed leaves piled high at our curbs, create an inviting place for small children to play. Please be very cautious when driving near any piles of leaves, children could be playing in them. A couple of weeks ago, one of my wife's coworkers avoided a near tragedy with kids hiding in a large pile of leaves he had at the edge of his driveway. Had he pulled into his driveway at a greater angle, he would have run over the small children, that he never saw hiding in the leaf pile. Fallen leaves also create a very slippery surface. If it rains and especially if the temperature drops overnight, leaves are as slippery as ice. Seniors please be careful and parents please tell your children of the extreme danger of playing in piles of leaves on the side of roadways.

This year we again plan to have ice-skating back in our harbor during the cold months. There will also be some minor alterations to the surface of the parking lot. These alterations will be included in a road-resurfacing project already going on in town, so the additional cost will be minuscule. Further, this location will not be subject to the vandalism we experienced last year.

The Borough is feeling the results as our National economy continues to slip. More local businesses are failing and we now have more open commercial spaces on First Avenue than in years past. We can help combat the effects this economy is having on our retail businesses by buying locally! Town people need to spend their money in town and the local merchants need to develop bargains to entice local people to patronize Atlantic Highlands businesses.

In an effort to entice merchants to take over their vacant space, I encourage landlords to keep their rents as low as possible.

The most egregious situation I see in our attempts to stay in business, personally as a small business owner, is the fact that the utility companies and government costs keep going up far above our income. The electric company, as an example has

increased its billing rate by 300% in the last 4 years. That means if you spent \$1,000.00 per week 4 years ago, now you are spending \$3,000.00 per week or if you bought an ice cream sundae for \$4.50 four years ago today you would buy it for \$13.50. This is a disgrace! We cannot go on like this. It must stop and be put in reverse! In this economy, stores and businesses can't survive without dropping their prices, even to levels of 5 or 10 years ago. Why should Utility companies be allowed to continue to bleed the life out of our people and our businesses? I vow to start a campaign to reverse the process. I will be calling upon other Mayors and Government officials to try to change this pattern in New Jersey.

As a Mayor, I am going to ask for an analysis, perhaps with the help of Senior Citizen Volunteers, to take a close look at what the town is being charged for the services it provides. Possibly, we can reduce some costs that would be transferred to the home and business owners here in town. The Borough needs to evaluate some of the ways its billing for service is done as well. One example is the water/sewer charges. Currently if you are one gallon over a threshold your bill jumps to the next unit of billing. For illustrative purposes only, if a resident or business uses 1,000 gallons of water in a quarter they are in billing "X". If they use 1,001 gallons they jump to the next billing level "Y". They pay the same amount of money at 1,001 gallons as they do for 2,000 gallons. I feel that there should be a percentage rate based on exact water consumption only.

Finally, as we celebrate the holidays and prepare to enter into the New Year, let me take a moment to wish you and your families' good health, and happiness for the remainder of 2009 and throughout 2010.

Is your job as rewarding as helping a neighbor?

As a volunteer of the award-winning Atlantic Highlands First Aid & Safety Squad you can do all of that and more.

The AHFAS is looking to add to its membership roster for 2010 - a roster which in the past year has been identified as the best in the state of New Jersey and in 2009 was named EMS Magazine's Gold Award winner.

"We're doing well, but we can do even better," said AHFAS chief Richard Huff. "We are actively seeking Atlantic Highlands residents to join the one of the most dynamic volunteer organizations in the country."

The Atlantic Highlands First Aid & Safe-

ty Squad is now in its 80th year of providing free, around-the-clock emergency medical and rescue services to the residents of Atlantic Highlands and occasionally the surrounding areas. The organization handles emergencies large and small, on land, water, and ice. The organization maintains a marine unit to respond to calls in the harbor. There's also a cadet group for younger members.

No experience is necessary. Training is provided for free. The requirements are manageable. We ask that members be borough residents, 18 or older, and once aboard respond to a minimum of 10% of the annual calls, or roughly one a week.

"We are particularly in need of residents who are available during the daytime hours to respond to calls," Huff said.

"Being a member of the AHFAS is a great way for people to be part of the fabric of our community, and help each other."

The AHFAS responds to about 500 calls a year in a borough of 4,700 people.

The Atlantic Highlands Police Department would like to address some trail etiquette and safety tips for those using the trail

community.

On April 25th Borough Officials dedicated the opening of the Bayshore Trail along the water from the Atlantic Highlands Marina to Popamora Point located at the Highlands boarder.

Trail Etiquette

• Travel on the right. Pass on the left. Never block the trail.

All trail users must keep to the right except when passing.

 Maintain safe speeds and travel in a consistent and predictable manner.

Yield to pedestrians. Cyclists must yield to pedestrians. Pedestrians always have the right-of-way.

- · Pets must be on a leash, clean up after your pets.
- Group users allow ample room for others to pass.
- · Always look ahead and behind before passing.
- Stay on the trail. Walk only on the designated paths to protect yourself. Walking off the designated trail can be dangerous.

Walking Safety Tips

It is best to walk in pairs or groups. If you must walk alone carry some identification with you and a cell phone.

> • If you are going on any extended walks inform someone of your route and expected return time.

• Use your intuition about suspicious persons or areas. Call the police immediately if something happens to you or if you notice anything out of the ordinary during your walk.

• It is not advisable to use the trail after dusk as there is no lighting along the trail.

This year the Shade Tree Commission of Atlantic Highlands has been very active. Arbor Day was celebrated with a proclamation by Mayor Rast. The public library, headed by Mrs. Marilyn Scherfen, had a program about trees and their importance. Mrs. Scherfen also organized a poster contest with the same theme for our elementary school children. Prizes were

awarded and another poster contest in planned for 2010, with the cooperation of the art teacher Miss Northrop.

In the spring we celebrated Arbor Day and planted a kwanza cherry tree in honor of former Police Chief Sam Guzzi for his service to the community. In the fall a tree planting was held, this time in Veterans Park, in memory of former borough employee Marvin Barrett as well as the residential trees planted.

During the year the shade tree commission mem-

bers also attended training and conferences on arboreal matters and also fielded questions and problems from members of the community dealing with trees. We are blessed with many large trees, some of which can have problems as they age.

DEAR VETERANS AND RESIDENTS OF ATLANTIC HIGHLANDS

THE AMERICAN LEGION, C. EUGENE ALLEN MEMORIAL POST 141, IS IN THE PROCESS OF HAVING AN UPDATED MONUMENT ERECTED TO COMMEMORATE THE 14 INDIVIDUALS WHO MADE THE SUPREME SACRIFICE DURING CONFLICTS. THE EXISTING MONUMENT IS A SMALL LOW-LYING MARBLE STONE WITH THE 14 NAMES ETCHED ON THE FACE OF THE STONE. IT IS LOCATED DIRECTLY ACROSS FROM TOWN HALL IN FRONT OF THE FLAG POLE.

WE ARE PLANNING A SIX SIDED MONUMENT APPROXIMATELY SEVEN AND ONE HALF FEET HIGH, AND TWO AND A HALF FEET WIDE AT THE BASE. EACH SIDE WILL HAVE AN EMBLEM REPRESENTING THE ARMY, NAVY, MARINE CORP, AIR FORCE, AND COAST GUARD. THE SIXTH SIDE WILL BE RESERVED FOR THE NAMES OF OUR FALLEN VETERANS. WE WOULD LIKE TO PRESERVE THE MEMORY OF THE FOURTEEN AND ALL THOSE VETERANS THAT SERVED, ESPECIALLY THOSE THAT GAVE THEIR LIVES IN ANY OF THE WARS OR CONFLICTS, AS WELL AS THOSE THAT ARE STILL MISSING IN ACTION.

WE ARE ASKING FOR YOUR HELP IN MAKING THIS NEW MONUMENT A REALITY. ALMOST ALL FAMILIES HAVE BEEN TOUCHED BY WAR AND/OR CONFLICTS, EITHER BY THE LOSS OF A LOVED ONE OR THROUGH THEIR PRIDE AND FEAR WHILE THE LOVED ONE SERVED THEIR COUNTRY. THE COST OF THE MONUMENT WILL BE APPROXIMATELY \$17,000.00.



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WINTER WEATHER IS COMING!

Please keep in mind, as winter weather, snow and ice approach, that all property owners are required to clear all of their sidewalks, or parts of the public way reserved for pedestrian traffic, of snow and ice within 24 hours after the termination of precipitation causing the sidewalk to be covered. Failure to remove such snow or ice during this time period will be a violation of Borough Ordinance #488 and may subject you to a summons, as well as personal liabilities if someone slips and falls.

DOG LICENSE RENEWAL:

As a courtesy, we would like to remind you that dog licenses expiring on December 31 of this year need to be renewed by January 31, 2010. Failure to do so will result in a \$5.00 late fee. Also, before renewing, please make sure the rabies vaccine is good for at least ten months of the next licensing year. You may need to present documentation of valid rabies vaccine before renewal is done.
