Summer Concert Series

As Mayor, I would like to clear up a few questions that have been asked by numerous residents.

The first regarding the Christmas display lights that had appeared on several telephone poles, along First Ave, during the month of May. The Beautification committee had been approached by our Christmas display vendor, who asked them to consider some new displays. It was agreed that they would put them up on several poles so the committee could evaluate them and make a decision. Atlantic Highlands is continuing to make our main street more attractive in every way possible.

Secondly, I have heard comments that the Borough's new Reverse-911 system had been used by me, for a political advertisement. This is completely untrue. I did serve as the Master of Ceremonies, at a political "meet and greet" at the Shore Casino, for a gubernatorial candidate in the upcoming election. I was asked to and did record a message inviting local residents to attend. The candidate paid for the telephone notification message, through a private vendor. The Borough's Reverse-911 system will not be used for any purpose other than emergency notifications to our residents, and protecting the well

being of our community.

Finally, we are continuing to draft building plans and designs for the renovations and new Library at Borough Hall. Bid packages will be prepared for potential contractors, which according to recent reports, Municipal bid projects have been coming in up to 30% below engineers project estimates. I and the Council feel strongly that this is a great time to take advantage of the economic down turn and favorable contractor bids. This project had been presented to the

public several times during the year. It is moving forward on time and we plan to start construction in the fall of 2009. Thanks to the excellent work of the Finance Committee, even with this new construction project, our Municipal budget will see a modest increase of just over one penny per hundred.

Stay Current with AH Happenings

Atlantic Highlands, although small in size is bursting with activities and events. There are so many things happening in town that are both fun and beneficial to residents and visitors alike.

So often we hear people ask "well how was I supposed to know that?" There is an expectation that Borough Hall should notify everyone, every time something is happening in town. With 2800+ homes and over 4700 residents, that is just impossible.

We have put in place ways for you to stay abreast of the "what's going on" in town. Many events and activities are listed on the scrolling bulletin board outside of Borough Hall, and we take great pains to keep our borough web site up to date and current. The web address is www.ahnj.com, and is probably the best source of information. We also provide you with the Beacon, delivered to your homes quarterly, and very often advertise events and local happenings in the Two River Times. The Atlantic Highlands Herald is also a good source of information.



2009 Sidewalk Repair Program

Borough Ordinance provides that all sidewalks in the Borough be re-laid, repaved and kept in repair at the cost and expense of the owner of lands in front of which the same shall be located.

To assist the homeowners in this obligation, the Borough had established the Sidewalk Program which essentially shares the cost with the home owner 50/50. The Borough is underway with its 2009 program and is offering the opportunity for you to participate.

If you are interested, please come to Borough Hall and submit your name, and the address for which you are looking to have the sidewalk repaired. The Borough will send a letter of interest asking you to supply measurements and the location of the area to be replaced. The Borough will go out and bid the project to ascertain the cost of repair, per linear foot, and enter into a contract with a vendor to perform the repairs. Please note that you cannot hire your own contractor to perform the repairs. The Borough will only pay for repairs provided by it's contracted vendor. If you are accepted into this year's program the total cost will be determined and you will be asked to submit payment to us, for your portion of the cost prior to the repair, and the Borough will pay the contractor the total bill.

The Borough has committed \$10,000 to this year's program making it possible to do \$20,000 in repairs. It is the Borough intention to do as much as possible with the monies allotted. If you are not chosen for this year's program, your name will automatically be carried forward into the following year. To be a participant you must be current on your taxes and water/sewer utility bills. This program is designed for residential properties only.

STRAUSS MANSION WINS STATE RECOGNITION AS HISTORIC SITE

The Strauss Mansion Museum is now officially eligible for the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places. This decision by the NJ State Historic Preservation Office (HPO) was announced in a May 5th letter to the Atlantic Highlands Historical Society, which owns and operates the building on Prospect Circle at the corner of Mount Avenue.

Described by HPO as "a strong representative example" of Queen Anne-style architecture, the Mansion is a 21-room summer cottage built in 1893 at the height of the building boom that made Atlantic Highlands a prime resort destination in

the Victorian era. Citing the Strauss Mansion's eligibility, the HPO described it as an "exuberant house" that was built for Adolph Strauss, a wealthy New York importer and merchant. Its 2 ? stories are topped by "a double-hipped roof with cross gables and two towers" -- one round and one octagonal. Other features singled out by HPO include "a two-story porch with classic columns," cladding of the house with "textured shingles in horizontal bands of alternating patterns," and "patterned wood floors, decorative wall surfaces, stained glass windows, mantels and staircases" in the interior.

The next step, going beyond eligibil-

ity, is to submit a nomination for the Strauss Mansion to actually be placed on the Register. It's the first structure in Atlantic Highlands to be eligible for the Register. The Historical Society is now applying for a grant from the NJ Historic Trust to hire an experienced consulting firm that would prepare the nomination and develop a comprehensive preser-

vation plan for the building from top to bottom.

Funds to match the grant mainly come from annual community events that the Society organizes. This year's schedule includes the House Tour on June 27, Arts and Crafts Festival on August 15 co-sponsored by the Chamber

of Commerce, Flea Market on September 12, and Lantern Tour at Hallowe'en time on October 23-24. In addition, funds raised by two other community groups this year are being channeled to the Society -- half the auction revenue at the PBA Ball on May 22, and the income from the Chilifest organized by the Front Porch Club on October 3. Members' dues and special contributions are also part of the mix.

DOG LICENSING REQUIREMENTS

ursuant to N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.2a, municipalities are mandated to issue annual dog licenses to all dogs seven months of age or over, for a licensing period beginning between January and June. In order to receive a dog license, the dog owner must first supply a rables vaccination certificate signed by a licensed veterinarian indicating that the animal's duration of immunity extends throughout at least the first ten months of the twelve month licensing period. Dogs that have a duration of immunity which expires prior to the ten month period should receive a booster vaccination prior to the issuance of a license. It should be noted that administering a rables vaccine before the duration of immunity of the previous vaccination has expired is NOT associated with an increased occurrence of adverse reactions in dogs or cats.

Also please not that cats are also required to be licensed by Borough Ordinance. Even though they "never go out of the house".

Failure to license or renew your license is a violation of Borough Ordinance 15-2008 and may subject you to a fine up to \$75.00.

The Blue Star Service Banner

he Blue Star Service Banner was designed, and patented in 1917 by World War I Army Capt. Robert L. Queisser of the 5th Ohio Infantry who had two sons serving on the front line. It quickly became the unofficial symbol of a child in the service. The Blue Star Service banners were a common sight during WWI and WWII. The Banner is displayed to show that a family member is currently serving in the armed forces.

Fat-Free Sewers: How to Prevent Fats, Oils. and Grease from Damaging Your Home and the Environment

ats, Oils and Grease aren't just bad for your arteries and your waist line; they're bad for sewers too.

Severe overflows and backups can cause health hazards, damage home interiors and threaten the environment. An increasingly common cause of overflows is sewer pipes blocked by grease. Grease gets into the sewer from household drains as well as from poorly maintained grease traps in restaurants and other businesses.

Where does the grease come from?

Most of us know grease as the byproduct of cooking. Too often, grease is washed into the plumbing system, usually through the kitchen sink. Grease sticks to the insides of sewer pipes (both on your property and in the streets). Over time grease can build up and block the entire pipe.

The results can be:

- Raw sewage overflowing in you home or your neighbor's home.
- An expensive and unpleasant cleanup that must be paid for by you, the home-
- ·Raw sewage overflowing into parks, playgrounds, yards, and streets.

- ·Potential contact with disease causing organisms, and
- · An increase in operation and maintenance costs for the Borough's Water and Sewer Department and the Atlantic Highlands/ Highlands Regional Sewer Authority.

What we can do to help

The easiest way to solve the grease problems and help prevent overflows of raw sewage is to keep this material out of the sewer system in the first place.

- 1. Never pour grease down sink drains or into toilets.
- 2. Scrape grease and food scraps frotray, plates, pots, pans, utensils, and grills and cooking surfaces into a can or the trash for disposal.
- 3. Do not put grease down garbage disposals. Put baskets/strainers in sink drains to catch food scraps and other solids, and empty the drain baskets/strainers into the trash for disposal.
- 4. Speak with your friends and neighbors about the problem of grease in the sewer system and how to keep it

What restaurant and building owners need to know about grease traps or interceptors

Restaurants, large buildings (such as apartment complexes and high rise apartments/condos), and other commercial establishments may have grease traps or interceptors that keep grease out of the sewer system. For a grease trap or interceptor to work correctly, it must be properly designed, installed and maintained.

Solids should never be put into grease traps or interceptors. Routine, often daily, maintenance of grease traps and interceptors is needed to ensure that they properly reduce or prevent blockages.

Be cautious of chemicals and additives (including soaps and detergents) that claim to dissolve grease.

Remember, fines can be imposed if it is found that your grease traps are not adequately designed and maintained.

"Operation Reassurance"

The Atlantic Highlands Police Department is reminding Resident of Atlantic Highlands about a program that we offer, called "Operation Reassurance." This program allows a resident who lives by him or herself the reassurance that their welfare will be checked daily. If a resident is interested in being a part of the program they can contact police headquarters for an application. Once the application is filled out, that resident will be put on our daily check list. Each morning between 7 am and 10am each participant in the program will call headquarters to advise us that everything is fine that day. If a phone call is not received by 10am the police dispatcher will call the residence and check on the participant. If there is no answer, the dispatcher will send an officer to the house to check on the person's welfare.

KIDS DON'T FLOAT, but if the US Coast Guard Auxiliary has its way they will

In the State of New Jersey it is the law that children 12 years of age and vounger must wear a lifeiacket at all times while underway on the deck of any boat. However preaching the obvious and getting results are two different things. Ten years ago a group called Safe Kids USA in Homer Alaska worked with the Coast Guard Auxiliary to establish a program of installing lifejacket loaner stations at local marinas. The concept is simple; they erected a rack on the waterfront and hung child size lifejackets on hooks. Boaters with children heading out on the water who did not have lifejackets could simply borrow one from the rack. It was understood that upon returning, the lifejacket would be returned to its hook ready for use by the next child.

The program was so successful that there are now 400 such sites across Alaska and the program has spread across the nation. Atlantic Highlands will be the first such station in New Jersey, with the first lifejacket station being established in the Atlantic Highlands Marina. Division 2 of District 1SR of the Coast Guard Auxiliary based at USCG Station Sandy Hook is instituting the KIDS DON'T FLOAT program here in Monmouth County

The program will begin with six lifejackets available in children's sizes. It is anticipated that the

supply of jackets will grow through donations of local businesses and individuals. While it might be thought that offering these jackets for free with no deposit might lead to loss of the property, the experience in other areas has been that the supply of jackets actually tends to grow.

The station and lifejacket rack were erected on the waterfront in time to coincide with National Safe Boating Week May 16-23 2009. A ceremony establishing the station was held to kick off the program. The Division Honor Guard, local dignitaries, members of the Coast Guard Auxiliary and Active Duty Coast Guard representatives, along with the Coast Guard bringing in their 47 foot ship, were present for the ceremony.

The crowd-pleasing boat decorating contest, "Deck the Docks", continues in its fourth year thanks to the Atlantic Highlands Harbor Commis-


sion. Trophies in addition to cash prizes for winners will be announced on July 4th at the Fair. You can obtain additional information at the Harbor Office.

The spectacular Bayshore trail was officially opened

n Saturday April 25, the Bayshore Trail was officially opened by Mayor Fred Rast. After 20 years, the trail has been completed and residents have a waterfront route between Atlantic Highlands and High-

By now, many of our residents have traveled the spectacular trail. On the recently opened part, the path starts out with pavement, eases into a boardwalk, and then becomes a cinder path through the balance of the trail. There are parts where it is just cattails surrounding the trail, trees line other parts, and finally, just the bay as the border. The trail finishes at the Monmouth County Park Systems latest addition, Popamora Point. While most of the trail is complete, the county still has some work to finish before Popamora Point (or Murray's Beach to longtime residents) will be fully functional.

The Bayshore Trail has a colorful history in our town. No public works project has taken so long or has been as eagerly anticipated as the bike path. The trail was built upon the former railroad bed and cost over \$1 million to construct. Fortunately, several Atlantic Highlands administrations have been successful in finding grants with most of the funding provided by a New Jersey Department of Transportation grant. Over the years, various state and federal agencies have been involved, with regulations regarding wetlands, handicap accessibility and path size continually changing.

Going forward, the maintenance of the trail will be split between the Monmouth County Park System and the Borough of Atlantic Highlands. Our town is responsible for the paved area while the county takes responsibility after the first boardwalk and cinder path. The maintenance agreement does not preclude volunteer groups from performing maintenance and local Scout troops have already been spotted cleaning up the trail. Patrolling and safety on the trail is a joint venture with the County, and Police Chief Jerry Vasto who has secured a \$1,000 grant for additional bike patrols.

The trail is a testament to great vision of many people and the tenacity of several administrations. It is time to enjoy the Bayshore Trail and the latest chapter in what makes Atlantic Highlands a great place to live.

Drivers MUST yield to pedestrians: It's the law!

1. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (2006), New Jersey is 7th in the country for pedestrian fatalities. 2. Each year, an average of 150 pedestrians are killed and another 5,875 are injured in New Jersey due to auto related crashes.

In New Jersey, the law is clear...

- Drivers must yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.
- Pavement markings are not required for crosswalks at intersections.
- Drivers may not overtake or pass another vehicle that has stopped for a pedestrian to cross.

 Turning vehicles must yield to pedestrians crossing during the WALK signal.

- No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.
- Every pedestrian upon a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, shall yield the right of way to all vehicles upon the roadway.
- Drivers failing to yield \$100 fine.
